

SCHOOLS and EDUCATION

While not a comprehensive, all-inclusive collection, the Newton Free Library's section on Newton schools is a good starting point for the serious student of education in this community. The researcher however should contact the Newton Public Schools archives.

From 1698, when the town of Newton voted to build a school house, to the present, Newton's residents have maintained a steady interest in, and support of, education. Coupled with this support has been a pattern of diverse and innovative approaches to meet changing educational needs.

From an emphasis on private schools, such as the West Newton English Classical School of the mid-1800's (grades k to 12), which attracted students from all over the world, the trend toward public education grew, with a public high school established in 1859. Concern with education beyond high school is a historical concern, with 60 percent of Newton High School graduates in 1871 going on to college.

Newton established kindergartens in 1893, manual training in 1896, a technical high school in 1905, and a day nursery at Stearns School Center for children of working mothers in 1906. Post-World War II emphasis was on grants, innovative curriculum, new buildings and the establishment of a Junior College. The 1960's saw a growing emphasis on increased student self-discipline, reflected at Meadowbrook Junior High School, Murray Road School, and open campus at all high schools.

The library resources include a collection of older School Department, studies and reports as well as some of the older 19th Century School Committee minutes and copies of all the high school yearbooks. The Newton North yearbook the *Newtonian* and the Newton South Yearbook *Regulus* are on line up to the year 2014. The high school yearbooks are the backbone of the Newton Collection being the most used item in the collection. These yearbooks allow us to view the past in the present, particularly when we are looking for a famous person who attended either Newton North or Newton South High School. For example if you look on page eight-eight of the *Newtonian* for 1924 you will find sophomore Betty Davis pictured there.

In 1884 Kate Carroll founded the Miss Carroll School which operated at 78 Temple Street in West Newton, Massachusetts until it became inadequate. The building was known as "The Little Red School House" and the "Brown Cottage." The present building at 147 Prince Street, West Newton, was built in 1902. Miss Rosalie Carroll

succeeded her aunt as Principal and after Miss Rosalie's death in 1938, Miss Mary Barbour, who had been associated with the School since 1900, carried on until 1952.
